Well, what a term 3 we are having! My staff have been extremely busy providing our students with the best opportunities for authentic and deep learning. Those of you following our Facebook page will have seen the congratulations coming thick and fast recently!





### Minister's visit to Oakbank

Mr Blair Boyer, Minister for Education, Training and Skills, visited us at Oakbank on 22 August. This was a very positive school visit, of only a few which he undertook at schools, whilst in the hills for Country Cabinet.

He was very impressed by the work he saw in the primary area, including that focussed on literacy and intensive small group work with our expert SSOs. He was also brought back to his own roots growing up on a farm in country Victoria as we explored the Ag program, including the ifarm. He has agreed to help us out with several thousands of dollars of additional funds to help get the Apple and Pear donated root stock into the ground to expand our orchard.

His adviser also noted that we have obviously not had any significant capital works for a long time at Oakbank School. It is good to be on the radar with this.

### **Royal Adelaide Show**


With the arrival three years ago of Melanie Welsh, our Agriculture Science teacher, our agricultural program has been revived and renewed to provide our students with real connections to local industry.

# NAPLAN NATIONAL ASSESSMENT PROGRAM Literacy and Numeracy

Families with students in Year 3, 5, 7 or 9 will have received NAPLAN results for their child. This year's testing represents a new beginning for data analysis for NAPLAN. As the national testing body has changed the test parameters this test can not be compared to data from previous years.

Our intense and narrow focus on reading improvement across the school has seen our results in NAPLAN Reading gain some pleasing traction. Recent analysis of our site compared to other sites in the Hills shows that our students are achieving above average in this region.

We can see from our 2023 results that our focus on reading is having an impact in many year levels. Our year 5 data is outstanding and in addition our Year 3 and Year 7 at Oakbank are on average achieving significantly higher than our other local students in literacy. Our Year 9 cohort is still below where we would like them to be however, interestingly this aligns with our state wide data on NAPLAN results at Year 9. Many factors could be at play with this cohort including the lingering effects of a disrupted start to high school due to COVID.

Percentage of students who achieved in the highest 2 bands across each year level in NAPLAN Reading:

	Year 3	Year 5	Year 7	Year 9
Oakbank School	67%	81%	69%	43%
All Hills Schools Heysen	58%	68%	59%	50%

It is important to remember that whilst NAPLAN can provide some trend data for groups it is not as helpful to be read on its own for individuals. For individual students it is always important to triangulate this with other data sets to gain a truer perspective of each student's achievement. Our teachers do this with a range of data sets and assessments as well as with in class observations. Please have a chat to your child's teacher/s if you would like to know more about where their reading levels are currently at and how they are being supported in classes.

The commitment made by all Oakbank teaching staff to focus on embedding evidence-based reading strategies into every subject area this year is bearing fruit and I look forward to continue this pro-active work with staff into 2024.



### Yr 10-12 Progress reports

Students in Year 10-12 will receive progress reports at the end of term 3. These will let you know if your child is on track to pass at this point in time. You will be notified via email when these are able to be downloaded from Daymap Connect

Daymap Connect for Parents is our main form of communication to and from the school and I continue to ask all families to ensure you have your parent/carer access working. Without this you will not be able to have a full picture of your child's education at Oakbank School. Our friendly and

patient IT staff can help you with this access. Please even bring your phone or laptop to the site to get help in person if needed. Each parent can have their own login and students have their own login. Please do not rely on your child's login only as this will not give you the same access as a parent/carer.

Finally, I wish you all a safe and fulfilling break time whilst your children are on school holidays. The lovely spring weather is a great opportunity to head outside and enjoy the natural environment we are spoilt with in this part of the world!

# **STEM Aboriginal Learner Congress**









On 10 and 11 August, Patricia, Jadzia and Anna went to the STEM Aboriginal Learner Congress at the Adelaide Convention Centre. This was designed to inspire future STEM innovators and connect to their Aboriginal Culture. It was attended by over 750 Aboriginal students from 180 schools.

On Thursday, we listened to a key note speaker, **Daniel Riley**, from the Australian Dance Theatre and then ventured to the Adelaide Zoo. We were given a map and had to find information about animals. We listened to a Keynote Speaker, **Mikeala**Jade from Indigital. Mikeala is a digital technologist and launched Indigital which is the first Indigenous edu-tech company. She is developing software for schools and the community to connect Aboriginal Elders to their community through digital technology. Our last session was gaining information from an Indigenous astrophysicist by asking questions.

On Friday, **Natan Noel** spoke as the key note speaker. He is a marine biologist and the Environment Protection Agency. Natan was inspiring to listen to. He spoke about how he struggled to concentrate in school and didn't focus on science or maths in his SACE years, even though he always wanted to be a marine biologist. He still completed his SACE, but afterwards found other pathways to help him pursue his dream. He volunteered at different organisations, won scholarships and ended up at Flinders University. His message about persistence and achieving your goal was amazing.

Our first workshop was run by **Berri Regional Secondary College**. They taught us about **Jimmy James**, an Aboriginal tracker, who helped find a lost girl in the Adelaide Hills in 1966, 2 nights after she had been abducted. We got to look at some tracks and had to problem-solve which tracks we thought they were as well as creating our own tracks in kinetic sand.

At the end of the congress, we got to listen to **Corey Tutt,** founder of Deadly Science - a not-for-profit organisation that provides STEM resources to remote schools in Australia and connects young Indigenous people with STEM professionals. Corey was another inspiring speaker, who spoke about barriers he has had to overcome. When growing up, Corey fell in love with STEM but found the inspiration and encouragement was not there for Aboriginal people to pursue careers in STEM.

Patricia, Jadzia and Anna represented Oakbank respectfully and enjoyed the experience of the congress. It was a great opportunity for them and hopefully this Congress is offered in the future.



Puzzles and games – anything with a dice really – will help kids enjoy maths, and develop number sense, which is critically important"





# 4/5 Maths



The 4/5 class is learning all about measurement in maths. We currently have a focus on measuring with formal and informal units. Students had to measure their partner with a range of informal units and make some comparisons using their data.





Students were then all given the same informal unit of measurement – a whiteboard marker – and had to measure 3 things in the room. They had to place their measurements on a whole class number line. This created some excellent conversations as students had recorded their measurements using fractions and decimals. Students had to consider which fractions were bigger or smaller and how the decimals fit into their number line. They also had to decide if the measurement of '1 and a little bit' was an accurate measurement. Some fun and engaging hands-on maths!




