This year our upper primary students have been involved in a trial of an evidence-based Maths program focused on place value. These students were tested at the beginning of the program in term 2 and again at the start of term 4.

Students have progressed significantly during this time, with the average growth being an equivalent of 18 months of growth in approximately 6 months. This progress was due to the quality of the program being delivered by our upper primary teachers in an exceptional way. We will be signing up to this program in its full capacity in 2024.

Timetable changes

Our secondary timetable will move in 2024 from having two doubles per week to having one double and two single lessons each week per subject.

School Uniform

Wearing school uniform is a compulsory part of attendance at Oakbank School. Wearing school uniform promotes inclusivity and safety across the school community. All students are expected to wear school uniform.

Please be aware that I will be asking my staff to closely monitor and follow up non-uniform attire in 2024.

When thinking about making purchases of clothing over the Christmas break ensure that the items meet the uniform requirements. Pants must be navy blue. Leggings are not appropriate, neither is black attire. Buying the right items, the first time, will ensure that money is not wasted on purchasing inappropriate items that will need replacing.

We will be trialling the introduction of neat blue jeans or chinos in 2024 after a request from students and a positive response from parents and caregivers. More details will come out later in the year to provide guidance on what is appropriate and meets the uniform policy.



COMMISSIONER'S DIGITAL CHALLENGE



Since 2019 the Commissioner for Children and Young People in South Australia (Helen Connolly in 2023) has provided a resource which enables students to develop digital technology understanding, skills and knowledge in three areas of thinking. As a part of their demonstration of this gained knowledge they can enter into a competition.

Children and young people from over 200 South Australian Government, Catholic, Independent schools (as well as even having students from overseas) have been involved each year.

The Commissioner's Digital Challenge enables our students to go about completing a variety of demanding tasks which really challenge their problem solving abilities. The Commissioner, Helen Connolly put forward this thought:

"Our future requires bold thinkers who know how to create intelligent and out-ofthe-box solutions."

She further goes on to state that:

"I want children and young people in South Australia to be informed, skilled, and fearless in their approach and participation in the digital world. I want them to be confident they have the knowledge they need to be engaged and empowered digital citizens"

The competition is aligned with the Australian Curriculum and caters for students from Year 2 through to and including Year 8 students. It has three areas of study for the students to participate in.



Digital Thinking - "Speaking Robot"

Students are required to complete 5 computer programming challenges.



Design thinking - "Space to Dream"

Students need to design a toy or a gadget that can be used on Mars for someone their own age (they needed to consider factors such as Mars has no air, little gravity, sparse or no resources such as water and plants, it needed to be mobile and light, easy to store etc). They must submit a labelled technical drawing and create a 3D Computer Aided Design representation.



Systems Thinking - "Zoom Out"

Students look into and gain knowledge about systems and how components have specific purpose and have specific roles making it a system. Students look into this in relation to computer systems identifying components, how thigs work together and why.

How large is the Challenge?

The **'Learn to Speak Robot'**Challenge was completed by an estimated **19,026** South
Australian children and young people involving **217** schools, **31** libraries and number of SA Scouts and Guides groups.

In 2020, 'Space to Dream' design thinking challenge and similar participation numbers were achieved. So it is safe to assume there were many more participants this year as it has grown in popularity every year.

In 2021, the systems thinking challenge 'Zoom Out' was added, and despite the disruption caused by COVID-19 an estimated 38,000 children and young people completed one or all three of the digital challenges that year, with similar participation numbers achieved in 2022, and potentially even more this year.

Oakbank School Achievement

This year we entered our students from year 5, year 6, year 7, and year 8 into this wonderful range of tasks in digital technology.

This involved 126 students participating in a range of challenges suitable for their ability and year group. Students at our school clearly showed their ability by completing a total of **387** certificates. Year 5/6 achieved 81 individual certificates, the year 7's achieved 162 certificates and the year 8's achieved 144 certificates with a 100% completion rate across all year groups. What an amazing achievemen!

In the overall standings Oakbank School was awarded Joint Winners in both the **Zoom Out** and **Space to Dream** categories. The students were amazing in their endeavours to complete 5 programming tasks each and to gain a better understanding about systems. As winners we actually won an option of a whole school Photographic package including a drone video and photographs or a newly developed school website which the school will be taking advantage of at the end of 2023 or early Term 1 2024.

Students submitted a 35 word reflection on being involved in this activity and we were lucky enough for two students to have their writeups include on the commissioners website, what a great effort this was.

It is fabulous to also report that in the individual challenge "Space to Dream" category we also did exceptionally well. It is my great pleasure to announce the two of the winners were Emily Officer and Matthew Hudson, who describe their "See Far" design as:

"A video camera which uses artificial intelligence to work that is shaped like a pair of glasses that you control with your eyes and nose.


The camera can record what you are looking at. A drop down screen can detect water and other features and tell you how far away they are."


This design easily adhered to the criteria and clearly showed superb imagination and creativity. Their technical drawing was extremely well done and their ability to create a 3D model of their idea was superb.

Matthew and Emily's design will be 3D printed by Challenge partners Makers Empire and represent Oakbank School in the **Australian Space Discovery Centre Space to Dream Exhibition**, along with approximately 20 top rated Space to Dream 2D and 3D design, The exhibition opens December and continues through to the end of January 2024. From February they will also feature in the **Commissioner's Space to Dream Travelling Exhibition**, travelling to participating metropolitan and regional libraries around South Australia.

Starting at the end of Term 3, the R/1 students began using their math skills to plan, organise and begin getting ready for the Family Games Night in Term 4, 2023. As the class teacher for these students I must say I couldn't be any prouder of the effort they put in to creating a myriad of items to be sold, as well as the enthusiasm to help out on the night.









The maths focus for this term has been on capacity: What does a container hold? Does my container hold more or less than...? Will this container hold the same amount as that container? Can capacity be used with sand and water? How many measures will it take to fill? What container will hold more water to wet Mrs. Cairns (yes, they did that!)?

Below is a list of the items that were at the lemonade stand and the maths needed to create and sell them:

Propagated Lavender

Measuring a length about 2 match box cars, count to 20 (soaking), money exchanging/place value/addition and subtraction (50c ea)

0-9 Number Magnets

Colouring in 10 magnets (counting), money exchanging/place value/addition and subtraction (10c each or the set for \$1.00 (10 groups of 10 = 100cents or \$1.00)

LEMON letter Magnets

Colouring in 5 magnets (counting), money exchanging/place value/addition and subtraction (10c each or the set for 50c (5 groups of 10 = 50 cents)

Bookmarks

Cutting ribbon (measuring), money exchanging/place value/addition and subtraction (30c each or 2 for 50c – adding and subtracting)

Lemonade-Squeezing

Fractions (cutting lemons into 2 halves), capacity (squeezing juice to fill the containers, finding the right size containers to hold the juice).

Lemonade-Making

Measuring: Capacity, Fractions (full cups and half cups), Temperature (warm water, cooling fridge), capacity of solids and liquids (sugar, water and juice), money exchanging/place value/addition and subtraction (10c for ½ cup, 20c for a full cup).

Cake

Money exchanging/place value/addition and subtraction (50 cents per slice)







Yr 10 Science of Motion

In term 4, Year 10 students have been challenged to describe the nature of moving objects, investigating WHY and HOW objects move, or don't.

From tug of war to obstacle courses we have put our bodies on the line learning more about the balance of forces acting on all objects. Balls have been bowled, rolled and dropped from great heights as we question our understanding of the laws of physics.





To kick us off, we hosted a workshop with Flinders University educators about roller coaster designs and their impact on speed, distance and force. Every student has competed against Usian Bolt's world record time, learning to measure and calculate their own speed, Usain's acceleration, and the force required to overcome the inertia of a body at rest.

Next we design group investigations, looking at ways to multiply the speed or accuracy of their throwing actions.

Thank you to the PE staff for graciously allowing us to borrow new equipment each week, and to Darren for keeping our school ovals in great condition as we commit to time outdoors, staying in motion this term.
