# Welcome to School Oakbank 52024



What a terrific start to the year it has been. I have enjoyed the opportunity to connect with many of you at our Family Orientation Evenings this term. In particular, I welcome our new families, including those of all our new Reception and Year 7 students.

For those of you who could not make it to one of our Family Orientation Evenings, the following is an extract of the speech I gave to families. I feel it is important to share this with the whole school community as it will help you to make the connection to what we are going after to improve learning opportunities and outcomes for your children in 2024. You will also understand further how you can support your child on this journey.



I am very proud to be leading Oakbank School and I am pleased that you have chosen to start or continue your child's educational journey with us.

> At Oakbank School we welcome and include a diverse range of children and young people. We embrace each and every one of your children and we know what amazing children they are.

As a school we are growing significantly every year as families chose this wonderful inclusive environment for their children's education.

Connection is one of our core values and this includes connection to community.

Oakbank School has been an important part of the Oakbank community for 85 years and over this time the local community have worked with the school and over time made different judgements about our school.

What is important to hold close to our hearts is that our school is you; your family; your children and my staff – together we determine who our school is and how it is perceived in the local community. What we all say, and what we all do, matters.



# Connection. Respect. Responsibility. Ready to Learn.

I am aware that when others in our community see our students in their Oakbank uniform, they immediately see our school and what we stand for. Every one of you and your children represent who our school is in the community. This year we have already had positive feedback from community members, not directly connected to Oakbank School, about how our students are looking good in consistent school uniform. Thank you for supporting this and ensuring your children are in the correct uniform.

The way we look as a school community both within and outside of our school stands for something. I want our community to be seeing Oakbank students and knowing that they are the respectful, responsible and friendly children and young people we know they are.

This year you will see that we have clear expectations around uniform, learning and behaviour to help our community understand who we are. The way we ask our students to wear our Oakbank uniform says that we value connection and respect and being part of a team. The way we ask our students to complete their school work says that we value growth and perseverance. The way we expect our students to make good choices in the classroom says that we value responsibility and collaboration with others. All these things represent what we value, what we are working towards, what we hope to achieve.

If you examine the imagery in our school logo, you see the multiple rings coming out from the centre. What do these say to you? Maybe you see growth, like the rings visible on a fallen tree, or sharing like a yarning circle, or layers of community coming together.

Ultimately, the logo represents our values and who we are at Oakbank School. We are a place that exists with a clear purpose to help our children learn; learn subjects like Maths and English, Arts and Technology but also learn to be a respectful, responsible person who is connected positively with others.

The rings of our logo may also represent that protective layer that our school provides to your children as they grow and learn how to work successfully with those around them and in the community.

This year at Oakbank our teachers are committed to providing your children with that clear guidance to help them be well set up for a successful education and eventually life beyond school. I know, that you as parents and carers also seek this for your children. Every day, you support this by ensuring they are well rested for school, packing a healthy lunch, waking them up and helping them to learn to be organised in the morning and supporting them with homework after school. Your role is hard (believe me I know, having raised 4 children myself), but so vital to ensuring your child gets the best education. Together we make this work for your child.



# National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy Information for Parents and carers

- All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in Australia do NAPLAN tests in March each year.
- NAPLAN tests students' skills in reading, writing and maths.
- The test questions are presented in Standard Australian English dialect.
- Students read some of the questions and listen to others with headphones.
- The tests will get easier or harder, depending on how students are going in the test.
- Students do four different tests. The names of the four tests are:



- Students in Year 3 will do the Writing test using pencil and paper. Year 3 students will answer the other test questions on the computer.
- Students in Years 5, 7 and 9 will answer all their test questions on computers.
- Teachers will help students get ready for NAPLAN tests.
- Schools will get their students' results. The school will then give parents/carers a report showing their own child's results.
- Parents/carers can talk to the teacher about these results.
- NAPLAN shows how students are going all over Australia. People who work in the Australian Government, state and territory education authorities and schools use NAPLAN results. The results let them see which schools are doing well and which schools might need help.

#### What can I do to support my child?

You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best! Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance. Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN.

# Ready to Learn: Fostering a culture of learning & excellence

This year we have embarked on a journey of revisioning our culture of learning at Oakbank School. Our Ready to Learn approach to positive behaviours for learning, built upon our values of connection, respect and responsibility, has seen a transformation in our classroom environments, our students' posture towards learning, and a renewed culture of personal responsibility to pursue excellence.

At the end of last year, a selection of students and staff had the opportunity to lend their voice to creating a range of value statements that would further enhance who we are at Oakbank. Over time, these value statements will continue to shape our language and foster a culture of collective understanding and belonging. Our new value statements can be seen throughout the school on our Ready to Learn posters (and on our next page).

Not only do our value statements provide language for our students to embrace as citizens and learners, they also provide a conversation point for staff with students, both to reward positive behaviours, and assist with re-directing behaviours that don't facilitate positive learning.

Communicating with care, understanding different perspectives and opinions, respecting where we are and who we are with, taking responsibility for our choices and learning to collaborate with others, are a selection of the skills and dispositions we

desire every child to embody as a student of Oakbank.

In living out our values and owning our value statements, our students are showing what it means to be Ready to Learn.

A culture of learning and excellence is not something that can be enforced or shaped by one person, or a leadership team. Rather, it is an environment that is grown by every person who calls Oakbank School their home of learning and growth.

Staff commitment to our new Ready to Learn approach to learning has been exceptional. I wish to publicly commend our staff for they way that they are embracing our cultural shift and are curating classroom environments that facilitate and foster opportunities for excellent learning and growth.

In each and every lesson, our staff ensure that four consistent and clear expectations are upheld for the benefit of every student and their learning. In every lesson:

- students line up outside the classroom to demonstrate to the teacher that they are ready to enter and ready to learn
- there is a seating plan for every student which helps with regulation and ensures consistency
- the teacher has a Ready to Learn cue. This phrase, when shared aloud in the classroom, prompts students to refocus on the teacher and show they are ready to learn.
- students need to have tidied their area, pushed their chair in and be standing behind their desk, before they will be invited to leave the classroom. This shows respect for their teacher and the space.

Our students have shown in the first weeks of the term the positive impact that Ready to Learn has had on their own learning and their classroom environments. As one student shared with me:



Our classrooms are so much calmer. I am able to learn in ways I haven't been able to before.

As parents and community members, I invite you to take the time to understand what it means to be a part of Oakbank School and ask questions about our Ready to Learn approach. By partnering with us we can all help our young people continue to grow their character and capabilities for every future. Connection, respect and responsibility will be values that continue to shape our students and staff for many years and our Ready to Learn approach to positive behaviours will be the foundation upon which our students thrive.

#### What does a Governing Council do?

Made up of a vibrant group of positive and engaged parents and caregivers, a community representative, the Site Leader (Principal) and nominated Staff Representative/s, the Governing Council provides governance and oversight for Oakbank School. Governing Council guides, monitors and works together with the Site Leader to set and approve broad directions for the school. The Site Leader, rather than Governing Council, is responsible for the day-to-day management and operations of the school.

#### **Governing Council** works with the **Site Leader** to:

- involve the local community
- develop and approve local policies
- set the broad direction and vision of the site
- monitor and review the site improvement plan
- fundraise and support school community initiatives

#### The Site Leader works with Governing Council to:

- give educational leadership
- carry out the site's policies
- carry out the site improvement plan.
- preparing and supplying financial reports to the council via the finance committee.

Our governing council generally meets twice a term on a Wednesday night to talk about the direction for the site, with smaller sub groups meetings organized as required for special projects. Members also work with the school and community on events, fundraisers, special projects, consultations and panels.

### R/1 Maths

The reception and Year 1 class has started the year off concentrating on NUMBER maths through games and activities, while developing a GROWTH MINDSET to help them overcome misconceptions and challenges along the way.

#### We asked the questions:

- · Why do you think we count things?
- What have you counted before?
- Do you count things at home?
- Do you see other people counting?



**Reception students** thought about these questions as they built upon skills that focus on understanding and demonstrating the five principles of counting (shown above).

**Year 1 students** have been reconnecting with these principles while continuing to build their number knowledge (up to 120) by recognising number patterns within a 120 chart, recognising numbers and creating larger 2-digit quantities

# **Challenging Negative Thoughts**

It takes time to identify when we are going down a negative thought spiral, it's often something that we've been doing for a long time, so start small and know that every time you challenge a negative thought that it is an accomplishment.

Here are some thoughts to try when challenging negative thoughts:

What would I say to a friend who was thinking this way?

What is a more helpful thought?

What can I do that will help me in this moment? (distraction, grounding, being kind to myself)

Will this thought matter in a week, month, year?



### Down on the Farm

It has been a busy start for 2024 on the Ag Farm. No wonder with the Agriculture curriculum from R-12 this year and an eventful week 2 with the arrival of 100 day-old chickens and a calf!







Diamantina was here at Oakbank in 2021 as a calf and competed with our students at shows that year. 2022, Diamantina and her sisters were involved with our breeding program and with positive pregnancies moved to a dairy farm at Mypolonga to start their dairy careers. Fast forward to week 2 and Diamantina returned with one of her sisters, Delta, to give birth to her second calf here at Oakbank. Diamantina welcomed a heifer calf on 9 February - Ellie Mac. Our year 9 Agriculture students are focusing on the dairy industry and the many careers within the industry and Diamantina is facilitating many aspects of the curriculum, coming into our 'small' dairy twice a day, we are using her milk for butter, cheese and yoghurt making along with scientific investigation in to microbes, food safety and nutrition.

Ellie Mac has been joined by the daughters of Gillian and Lisel, our heifers we successfully artificially inseminated last year using sexed semen to improve the chances of heifer calves. Both girls have calved in the recent weeks with their owner- Jervois Holsteins - and we are very grateful for Clem and Lee Mason for entrusting their calves with

us at Oakbank, being reared by the year 9 Agriculture students.

Also from Jervois Holsteins we have welcomed two heifers joining our extracurricular show team for 2024- Pride and Connie. They are entered for Mount Pleasant show Saturday 16th March along with Diamonds and Delta from our 2023 show teams.

Chickens! 25 meat birds are being raised by year 7 Agriculture students as they investigate and apply animal welfare requirements and consider ethical food production. Students will complete the paddock to plate program by designing, preparing and presenting a menu to guests at their pop-up restaurant in week 9 this term, supported by senior students. 75 Isa Brown chickens are beginning their journey to join our egg laying flock under the watchful eye of year 6 students. The journey of the birds will be closely followed, and data recorded and analysed. The learning outcomes are applied and select birds entered for the poultry competition at the Royal Adelaide Show later in the year.

### **Senior School Science**

Our Year 11/12 students started the year with a visit to The University of Adelaide where one group were fortunate to participate in a demonstration of transmission of pathogens through society.

This was followed by a quick swab of the University labs, and our personal belongings to assess bacteria count... and convince us all of the benefits to handwashing!





# Our Year 10's have been learning more about their traits, and how they are inherited from their parents via their genes and DNA.

This term started with extracting the DNA from strawberry cells, and has continued with the students making some tasty models of the DNA double helix and base pairs. In the coming weeks we will be growing modified seeds to determine how scientists can use genetics to predict the traits that will appear in the next generations. We certainly look forward to making more new discoveries along the way!


